

What is the Problem?

"A study conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) showed that Latinos had the second highest death rate from melanoma, after whites. Too often, people with skin of color mistakenly believe that they cannot get skin cancer. By the time they seek medical care, they often have latestage cancer. Melanoma can be deadly in the late stages. In the early stages, most skin cancers, including melanoma, are treatable and beatable."

• Elevate the profile of skin cancer within the community – including melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer – and that if detected early, skin cancer can be highly treatable

• Educate the Latino Community about risks of prolonged and unprotected exposure to the sun and provide tips on how to prevent and detect skin cancer.

Screening Events • Conduct **FREE** skin cancer screenings for the underserved Latino community in an effort to detect skin cancer, and provide information on how to prevent future sun damage.




