Visit the allusive exhibition at the Jamaica subway station



As part of the celebration of July 1, National Plant Health Day, Senasica and the Government of Mexico City set up the exhibition "Plant Health in Everyday Life" in the Jamaica subway, which, through 25 informative posters, seeks to raise awareness among citizens about the importance of plant health for food production.

The exhibition was inaugurated by authorities of the Agriculture Agency and the Metro Collective Transportation System (STC) and will remain open for a week in the corridor of that station of line 9, awaiting the visit of millions of people who use this means of transportation.

The posters display information on the history of plant health in Mexico, and infographics detail the characteristics of key foods for the population, such as corn and avocado, as well as exotic pests of economic significance, such as the Khapra weevil and the tomato moth, which are currently being eradicated in the country as a result of the joint work of plant health experts and growers.

Apart from these threats, our country is free of more than a thousand pests and diseases existing in the world, among them, the Mediterranean fruit fly, the giant African snail, and tropical banana fusarium, thus placing Mexico as one of the most privileged countries in phytosanitary matters.

Likewise, from June 26 to July 3, some emblematic buildings in Mexico City will be illuminated in green, as part of the celebrations of the National Plant Health Day.
