The Alliance for agroalimentary safety is both harmonious and effective

The reinforcement of the production of safe vegetables shows advances

The health agencies from Mexico and the United States jointly work to have a safe commercial exchange of agro-alimentary products, and thus protect the consumers in both nations from food-borne diseases.

On October 2020, the SENASICA, the Federal Commission for the Protection against Sanitary Risks (COFEPRIS), and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) renewed the Food Safety Alliance, which, through work groups establishes the foundations for a quick and efficient response upon the presence of foods compromised by physical, chemical, or microbiological contaminants.

This Alliance also enables the coordinated work of the laboratories from both governments, who coordinate their procedures and reinforce their technical capacities using available, modern, and smart tools and technologies. Nearly two years after the renewal of the Alliance, their work groups reported advances in the reinforcement of production of safe vegetables and the information exchange and communication mechanisms between the three health agencies.
