

Partnership for Mexican pig farming activities

Joint work to protect our livestock assets



The SENASICA works together with the legislative branch and organizations of pig farmers to reinforce the health and safety strategy on the production of foodstuffs from that protein source in Mexico.

The coordinated work between the links in the production of pork meat products protects livestock assets consisting of roughly 19 million pigs, which places Mexico as the thirteenth producer in the world, and as an exporting powerhouse for the most demanding markets: the United States, Canada, Japan, South Korea, China, Vietnam, Hong Kong, China, and Singapore, for the benefit of Mexican producers.

Prevention works to stop erysipelas diseases in pigs (such as the classical swine fever, circovirus infection, and African swine fever) from being introduced and spread, are essential to protect the health of the national pig farming sector.

The Secretariat of Agriculture and Rural Development called the legislative power and Mexican producers to continue with the timely reporting of any suspected exotic diseases, so the health authorities have grounds to act quickly and effectively, in the event of any emergency taking place in any region of our country.
